depressing for people, especially for those who are less fortunate. If you can reach out and help someone in need, I'm sure it will ease their burden and bring joy to you as well.



# RON LONG RETIREE CHAIRMAN

I was talking to a senior citizen the other day and I asked his age. He informed me that he was 100 years old. I was impressed and asked him what his secret to a long life is. He

paused for a minute and said, "I don't know, I will have to ask my dad". I asked where his dad was, and he replied. "Out fishing with my grandpa".

I thought I would start off today with a little humor and my wife said I was correct with the little humor. Humor is good because it takes our mind off all the negative stuff going on. You can't read the newspaper or watch the television without a crisis of sort going on. I recently was talking with Gene Keller, and asked him how things were going. He shared several issues and it got me to thinking that his situation is not isolated, and we all

may face decisions in life that we do not like or want to make.

One issue is our independence. We all pride ourselves on being able to care for ourselves and driving a car is a large part of that. We can drive to our doctor appointments. We can drive to the store and do our shopping. We can go visit our friends in the hospital or a nursing home. Driving gives us a ton of independence but what happens when you are no longer able to drive. Our independence disappears when that happens. We must depend on family and friends to drive us to what destinations are required. It is a terrible loss.

Another issue is hospital stays that force us to choose where and how we will rehab. In most cases that means a nursing home. Finding a nursing home is no easy task. I talk with a lot of members that are going through that process or will be facing that choice in the future.

Nursing homes! What defines a nursing home? Though the term "nursing home" is used rather generically by many people, it refers to a facility that provides 24-hour-a-day care to its patients. Not every patient will require the level of services offered by a true nursing home, making less expensive options such as an assisted living community or at-home care, to name only two of the many different viable alternatives. When you think about nursing homes, several alternatives are available, convalescent care center or rehabilitation center. This reflects the fact that it's no longer just assumed that a patient will remain in a nursing home for the rest of their life. Instead, these facilities address medical care needs that are often specific and temporary.

In many cases, patients may transition from a hospital stay to a skilled nursing facility and then eventually to an intermediate care facility as their medical care needs diminish.

Data from the Centers for Disease Control shows that overall, looking at all patients 45 years of age or older, 40% of males and 37% of females stayed less than one month in a nursing home, and another 20% of males and 19% of females stayed more than a month but less than three months. Only 4% of males and 7% of females had stays longer than five years.

Many facilities offer both skilled nursing and intermediate care under the same roof, so if your loved one is nearing discharge from the hospital and will require a step-down like this, finding such a facility will be an adjustment to a new setting and may eliminate the need to work through the process of selecting separate facilities that provides the care that is needed.

I hope this information helps those that are facing life changing decisions. Moving to any new location for what ever reason is no easy task. Now changing the subject...

At our last meeting we made the decision to discontinue meetings until the first of the year. With that in mind, your executive board wants to wish you a safe and Happy Thanksgiving with family and time together in a safe environment. December will be next and there are plans in the making to celebrate. We won't decorate the hall, but we may have a drive through Santa's village and celebrate the season with a flare.

In closing, on behalf of your executive board, we wish all our members and family a great Thanksgiving and a very Merry Christmas.

### High School Outreach Program

On October 5, Speedway High School hosted Ryan Noblet, along with Tony Harbin, Mike Garrison, and Gary Collins. They gave students a highlight reel of what Allison is all about. This included information about our products as well as job opportunities, apprenticeships and internships that are available. "The program is twofold," said Noblet. "It helps provide students with an option to join our company and it provides us with a feeder program from the school. The goal of the event is to explain to these kids, if they are going to college or not, that there are other avenues out there. We utilize STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) programs at schools with an Ivy Tech program for manufacturing engineering.

Other schools on the schedule for these visits include Washington High School and Ben Davis High School's Area 31. Area 31 is a program where students from area high schools (Avon, Ben Davis, Brownsburg, Cascade, Danville, Decatur Central, Monrovia, Mooresville, Plainfield, Speedway and Tri-West) attend a half-day of hands-on learning and real-world work experience. These two schools were chosen because of their proximity to Allison and their diverse student population.

"These opportunities are a good way for Allison to give back to the community, while helping us with our future hiring needs.

#### **ELECTION NOTICE**

### ELECTION COMMITTEE MEMBER Sunday, March 13, 2022

Per the UAW Local 933 Bylaws, Article 5 (Standing Committees), Section 2: The Election Committee shall consist of eleven (11) members, seven (7) alternates and four (4) reserve alternates, and shall be elected at a Membership Meeting in March. They shall serve for three (3) years and shall elect their Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary. Vacancies on the Election Committee shall be filled by the alternates and vacancies of the alternates shall be filled by the reserve alternates in order of votes received. In filling vacancies, if there was a tie in the vote, it will be filled in alphabetical order. When the number of reserve alternates decreases to zero (0), an election may be held to increase the number of reserve alternates to four (4). Alternates and reserve alternates will serve only as actual replacements for absent Election Committee members and/or as necessary. All members of Local 933 with one (1) year continuous good standing shall be eligible to run for the Election Committee

Any member desiring to run for the Election Committee shall send a letter of nomination to the Chairperson of the Election Committee, by registered or certified mail. Acceptance letters shall be postmarked no later than midnight the day designated. Voting for the candidates for the Election Committee will be by pre-printed paper ballot at the Membership Meeting and will be conducted by the current Election Committee.

Acceptance letters to run for Election Committee Member will be accepted from Tuesday, February 1, 2022 until 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, February 8, 2022. All acceptance letters must be mailed registered or certified mail-return receipt requested to:
