Organizing 101

The Importance of Organizing with the UAW: A Path Towards "A Better Tomorrow"

Introduction

In the late 20th Century, the United Auto Workers (UAW) stood as a beacon of hope and strength for millions of workers across the United States. With a peak membership of approximately 1.5 million in 1979, the UAW represented a formidable force in advocating for workers' rights and fair labor practices. However, the landscape of the American workforce has significantly changed since then. Today, the UAW faces a stark reality with a membership count of just over 971,000, a significant drop from its heyday. This decline is attributed to various challenges and despite these setbacks, the UAW continues to play a crucial role in safeguarding the interests of American workers. This article explores the importance of organizing with the UAW and how it remains a vital step towards achieving "A Better Tomorrow".

The Decline of UAW Membership

The journey from 1.5 million members in 1979 to just over 971,000 today is marked by a series of blows to the American manufacturing sector. Job outsourcing to countries with lower labor costs, plant sell-offs and closures, and the rapid advancement of automation technologies have all contributed to the decline in UAW membership. Additionally, the introduction of tiered employment systems within companies has further eroded the stability and security of workers' positions. These changes have not only affected our numbers but also the very essence of what it means to be part of the UAW.

Fighting for Workers' Rights

As I author this article your UAW Local 933/Rolls-Royce Shop Committee has been preparing for the upcoming 2025 contract negotiations. Before the Union bargains for our UAW members, we try to first establish the wants and needs of the members. That process has been completed through the collection of contract

demands our members submitted in September. Union membership demands are always a terrific way to help our committee understand their needs. Your elected officials also play a significant role in our efforts to bring a good contract back for a vote in March as they deal with contractual issues daily. Thank you to all members who submitted their demands. Demands are then separated by the committee into categories such as economic, noneconomic, benefits, health and safety, production, skilled trades, and general items. The demand process is broken down further by reading demands and extracting doubles. Not every demand is submitted due to the fact some demands are either already in our contract, or not beneficial to the whole membership. The Shop Committee asks for contact information in-case there are questions with demands our membership has submitted. In November 2024, the Shop Committee will begin talks with Rolls-Royce management as both sides submit their demands and the negotiating process begins. The Shop Committee has asked and received support of our UAW International Representation. This support includes legal and research departments as well as help from our UAW Aerospace Department to help ensure a level playing field as we bargain for our workers' rights.

In closing, your elected team asks for your support as we fight to erase tier wages, improve benefits, and help workers who want to retire, leave with a healthy pension and benefits. In the same breath we look to the future as we rebuild our factory with new work and new employees and a future that has job security and fair wages for current and future UAW/Rolls-Royce workers. When a profit is made by the company, we should never have to depend on an outside contractor delivery to know what our share will be. Your Shop Committee is ready, and we ask you to **Stand Up** with us as we negotiate a fair and equitable agreement for this Membership.

Since this Rocket article is just before several holidays, I would like to thank our Veterans for their service to this great country. May all our members/active/retired and families enjoy a blessed Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday and may we all start off the new year with a renewed effort to build stronger solidarity in Our Union.

Sunday, March 9, 2025

Per the UAW Local 933 Bylaws, Article 5 (Standing Committees), Section 2: The Election Committee shall consist of eleven (11) members, seven (7) alternates and four (4) reserve alternates, and shall be elected at a Membership Meeting in March. They shall serve for three (3) years and shall elect their Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Secretary. Vacancies on the Election Committee shall be filled by the alternates and vacancies of the alternates shall be filled by the reserve alternates in order of votes received. In filling vacancies, if there was a tie in the vote, it will be filled in alphabetical order. When the number of reserve alternates decreases to zero (0), an election may be held to increase the number of reserve alternates to four (4). Alternates and reserve alternates will serve only as actual replacements for absent Election Committee members and/or as necessary. All members of Local 933 with one (1) year continuous good standing shall be eligible to run for the Election Committee.

Any member desiring to run for the Election Committee shall send a letter of nomination to the Chairperson of the Election Committee, by registered or certified mail. Acceptance letters shall be postmarked no later than midnight the day designated. Voting for the candidates for the Election Committee will be by pre-printed paper ballot at the Membership Meeting and will be conducted by the current Election Committee.

Acceptance letters to run for Election Committee Member will be accepted from Tuesday, February 4, 2025 until 11:59 p.m., Tuesday, February 11, 2025. All acceptance letters must be mailed certified mail (and return receipt is recommended) to:


