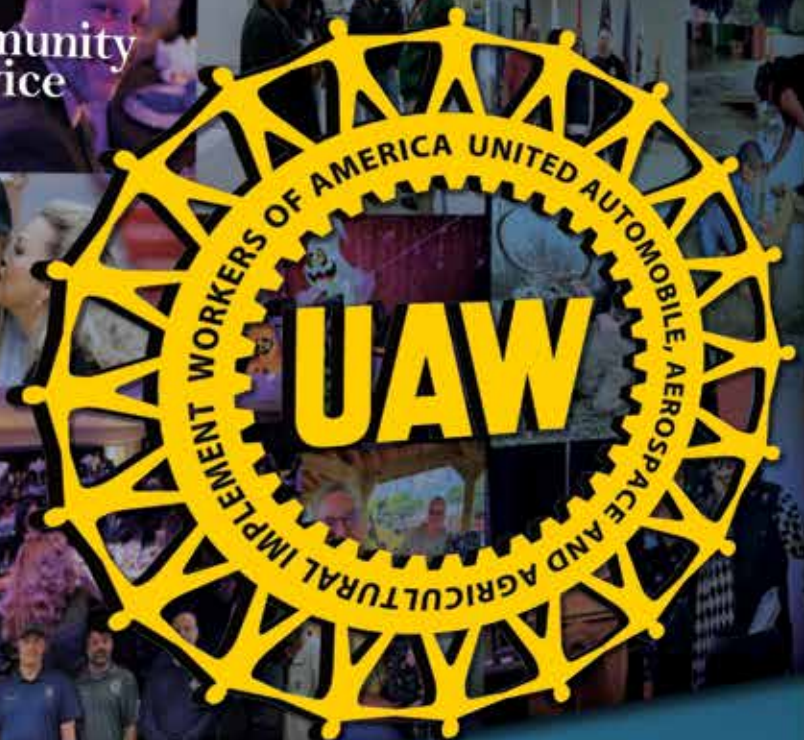

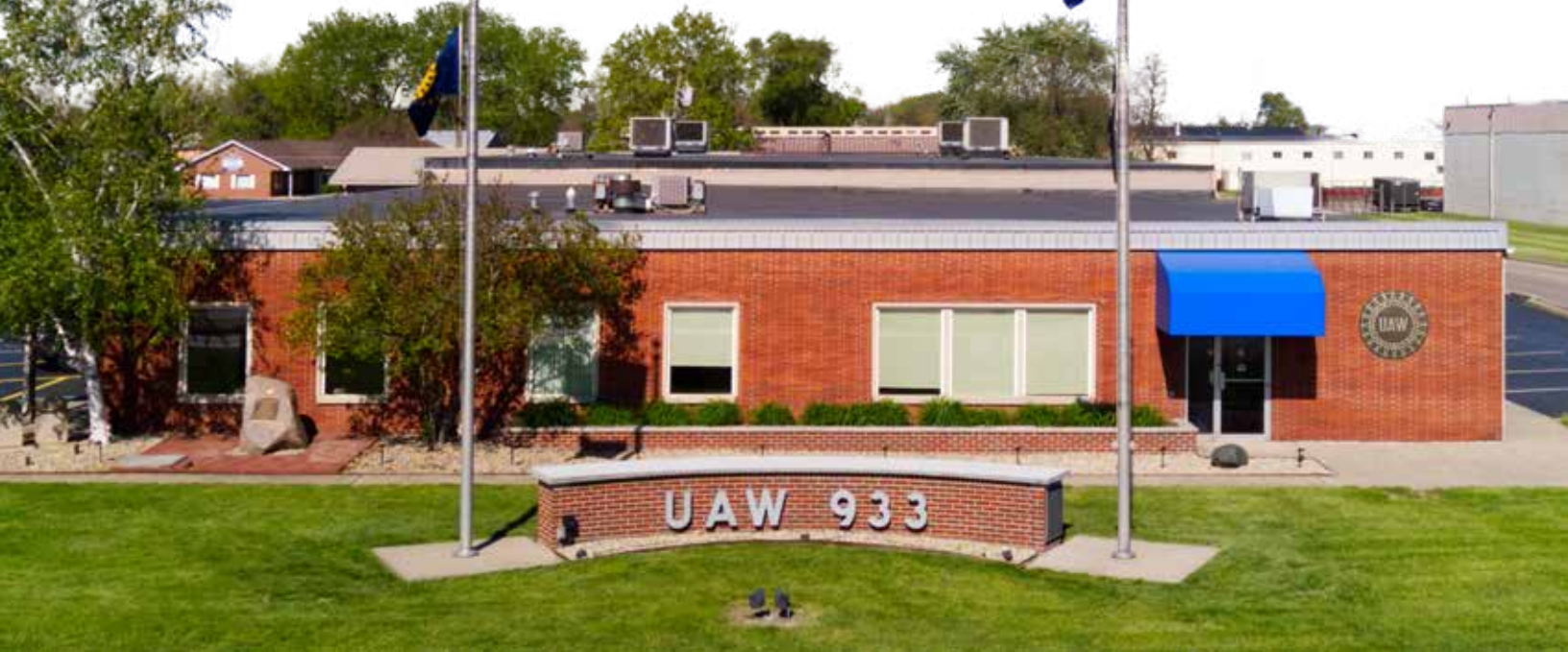

THANK YOU EVERYONE!

For voting in our General Election. I am grateful, yet humbled, to be serving as your President of UAW local 933 for another 3 years. Congratulations to the winners who will be sworn in at our Regular Membership Meeting on June 8th and assume their respective positions. Keep in mind that every elected position is important in the structure and operations of our local union. There is one Run-Off election for the position of 2nd Vice President being held on June 10th. Please exercise your right to vote in this important election where the winning candidate must win by 50% plus 1 of the total votes cast.

The Indiana Sheriffs Youth Ranch (ISYR) is closing

The ISYR is shutting down for good DUE TO STATE BUDGET CUTS requested by Governor Mike Braun. Per Scott Minier, Executive Director, ISYR was hoping the State of Indiana would renew its Indiana Department of Homeland Security Search & Rescue Training Center lease with a slight increase. This, and other actions, would have allowed ISYR to survive and thrive. Instead, the Braun Administration is pulling out of the existing lease early which was scheduled to run through 2029, a \$48,000 annual loss of operations expense.

The hope of ISYR is to reimburse as much as possible to major donors, like UAW, with the proceeds after all debts are satisfied from the sale. ISYR Executive Director Scott Minier said, "But our most important accomplishment was engaging more than 2,000 K-college Hoosier students each year in our day visits, overnights, weeklong leadership academies and special off-season events." The ISYR was an academy for kids who hope to be future law enforcement officers, at-risk children, young witnesses and victims of crime. The cuts to the state budget prematurely ended a long-term training and leasing agreement between the Indiana Department of Homeland Security and the Ranch.

Thinking of the number of children that have went through these programs, which we supported by membership action, if it affected just one child's life and made a difference, then the goal has been achieved. Who knows, they may grow up and be the Governor of this great state in which we live. So, for all the Drama Queens and Haters, remember, good deeds produce positive results.

That being said, Our Union will continue to be involved with community activities where the Community Service and other Standing Committees will keep pushing UAW involvement and awareness. Vetting the organizations and projects that we support and take action on is always reported out to the Membership. It's important to be involved, read your union newsletters and attend the quarterly Membership Meetings to know what's going on instead of making unfounded remarks on social media.

UAW/Rolls-Royce - Moving Forward

As we have completed the 2025 contract negotiations with great success and recently finished up our local bargaining and executive side elections, I would like to thank our membership for all your support during both processes. Congratulations to all those retaining their elected positions, and those who have ran for new positions and won. I would also like to thank those who ran and did not win. I appreciate your interest in getting involved with our Union. Thank you, Josh Smith and Miesha Thompson, for your years of service as Committeepersons. You have both done your jobs well.

With the contract behind us many employees have adjusted their focus to retirement. Since the beginning of the year 50 plus employees have made the decision to retire. During the length of the 2025 agreement, 550 of the 800 hourly employees will have 30 plus years of service. With that said several employees hired in 1995 and earlier are looking at life after Rolls-Royce. I would personally like to thank all retirees for your years of service and your great contributions to the UAW. We will miss you greatly and remind you that you are always part of our Union family. Should the Company make the decision to hire new employee's the Union will post information on all application processes.

As you may have heard, Rolls-Royce has added four new electric test cells to the Performance campus. This \$400 million investment known as project Riehle will ensure UAW/Rolls-Royce Indianapolis will be a facility that is alive and vibrant for years to come. Also, the Assembly and Test area in the Performance building is transforming. Recently it was determined the Lift Fan and Lift Works facilities in Plainfield, Indiana will be moved to the Performance building. As those changes are currently taking place, the move should be completed by late summer. The new B-52 re-engine assembly floor will now be in the Performance building. Originally this work was slated for the Excellence building even to the extent of a completed assembly floor in Excellence before plans were changed. Add in the new V-280 Blackhawk replacement (1107 variant) and you get a very busy Assembly and Test. It is great to see new product and investment in the facilities here in Indianapolis.

I know you will not receive this Rocket edition prior to Memorial Day but I would like to say thank you to all service members who died fighting for our freedoms. "May we never forget our fallen comrades. Freedom isn't free" -Sgt. Major Bill Paxton.

As politics play a great roll in the world around us it is important we all understand that the differences each of us have, make us who we are. The titles we may or may not have do not define us a human being and certainly not as Americans. As Union members we put a great emphasis on recognizing and respecting each other's rights to live your life. As a finalist, applications are assessed by a team of prominent community leaders and educators, who then select the winners based on ACT scores, class rank, extra-curricular activities, letters of recommendation, personality traits and leadership abilities. Documentation regarding class rank, extra-curricular activities, letters of recommendation, personality traits and leadership abilities **are required from all finalist**, but not required with the initial application.

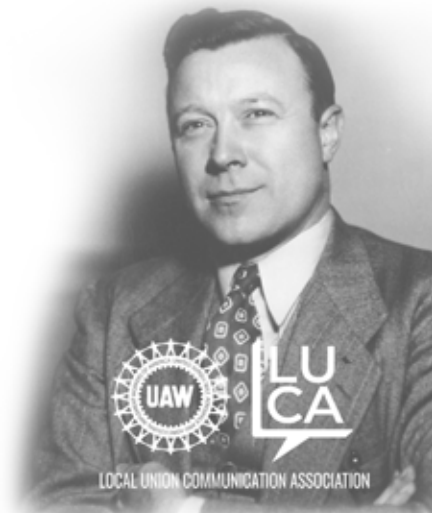
