Union members wear red shirts on Wednesdays as a sign of solidarity. When a sea of red shirts greets management, it's a way to let them know that the workers stand together.

This modern tradition goes back to 1989 with the Communications Workers of America (CWA) whose members began wearing red on Thursdays to commemorate the death of Gerry Horgan. Horgan was a CWA chief steward for Westchester County in New York who died of head injuries after being struck by a speeding car on a picket line. That vehicle was driven by a scab, the teenaged daughter of a manger. She was never charged for his death. Wearing the red shirt to show solidarity took on new meaning during Wisconsin's Gov. Scott Walker and his relentless attacks on labor in 2011.

Unionists around the country wanted to show solidarity with Wisconsin and donned red shirts once a week.

Today, it remains an act of showing unity, both to one another and the world. It's not anti-management; it's a positive statement of workers standing together.

GERRY HORGAN

1955-1989

In 1989, members of Communications Workers of America (CWA) Local 1400 were on strike against NYNEX in Valhalla, New York.

E. Gerald Horgan, a steward from CWA Local 1103, was walking the picket line with the strikers on August 15 when he was struck by a speeding vehicle driven by a scab.

Horgan died, leaving behind a wife and two very young children. We wear read to remember the tragedy and symbolize the sacrifice Gerry made that day to fight for worker rights.

We have moved to the negotiating site and by the time you read this we will be in full negotiating status. I am confident this Union leadership will fight hard for each and every member. We have all witnessed the struggles the auto industry has had in getting a fair

Member Spotlight

I was trying to figure out how to put this article into words. I just fed my kids dinner and was arguing with my 9-year-old about dessert. She had refused to try her vegetable of the day. I said to myself "some kids"

would kill for these". We've all said it, but for Theresa Ohaeme that's not too farfetched. Theresa is an associate for Ford which is part of the UAW Local 933. She's from Lagos, Nigeria. In Lagos, children are regularly abandoned and do not know where their next meal is coming from. Theresa is 39 years old and a college graduate from Olabisi Onabanjo University. She has a son who's 5 years old. She's in our country on Visa. Back home a child was abandoned and Theresa found her. That set everything in motion for Theresa. This again wasn't uncommon in Lagos and not the first child she'd seen abandoned. With most of the homes for children overcrowded she decided to do more than drop the child off. She rented a 3-bedroom flat (an apartment). She found two ladies to help her and let them stay at the flat. She started a small home for abandoned and homeless children. She was struggling back home after her divorce and a fresh start was





welcomed. When she talks about our country she glows. She even described it as peace and instant relief. This would be an awesome story

if we stopped here, but it's just the beginning. She struggled leaving the 15 kids that were in the home she had started but for her own mental health she needed the new beginning. So, in 2015 she made her journey here. She didn't forget that tiny 3-bedroom flat back home and has sent anything and everything she could back home. She keeps in contact through social media and video chats with the kids at the home. Her family back home helps when they can. She sends about three to five hundred dollars back each month for food and school supplies or whatever else is needed. She frequents Goodwill and Burlington Coat Factory and sends clothes back as well. With Christmas time coming up she informed me she tries to give the kids back home a decent Christmas. Most of the kids were abandoned at the home and their birthdates are unknown. She came up with the idea to celebrate the day they come to the home as their birthday every year. The children have had bad luck in life being abandoned but they're lucky there are people like Theresa in this world. I asked her if

there was anything you wanted the people who were going to be reading this to know. She said "We should all appreciate where we are in the world. Everything we have, the food on our tables and roof over our heads. You have a good life appreciate it". She's a special person who could have dropped that poor child off at an

overcrowded shelter but chose to do more. She wants to help as many kids as she can. She would love to save up enough to build a house back home. Twenty-nine kids in that 3-bedroom flat is pretty crowded. It seems fitting to me to end this article with a quote from Mother Teresa, "I alone cannot change the world, but I can cast a stone across the waters and create many ripples".

Just yesterday we were young, just married and starting life's journey with the love of our life. Yet in a way, it seems like eons ago. We wonder where the years went. We know we lived them, and we all have memories of our hopes and dreams. But here we are.... the winter of our lives. We are getting gray,

moving slower and becoming those old folks we never thought we'd be. Each day now, we find getting a shower is the real target for the day! Taking a nap is not a treat anymore...it's mandatory! Cause if we don't do it of our own freewill... we just fall asleep where we sit!

"Life" is a gift. The way you live your life is your gift to those who come after. Make it a fantastic one. Remember: it is health that is real wealth... not pieces of gold and silver.

GM and the UAW have a new contract and time will once again move forward. Our brothers and sisters voted to accept the contract and sadly, we retirees didn't fare well. We submitted 4 demands but to my knowledge no action was taken to address our requests. The one area we may have improved is the Legal Services. Expanded Legal Services may now cover spouses of UAW active and retired member. The union also bargained an expansion of covered office work services to include:

- Traffic Matters Tickets and moving violations
- Social Security Plan attorneys will answer questions about Social Security benefits, including those related to retirement disability, terminations or overpayments.
- Medicare and Medicaid Plan attorneys will provide legal guidance on issues related to Medicare and Medicaid benefits.

As we transition into the new contract, we know that the Benefit Rep for Indiana and Ohio is no longer with us and there are many questions and concerns. In the meantime, use the following telephone numbers to ask for assistance with your issues.

Pension questions – 800-489-4646 Health Care questions – 866-637-7555 All other questions – 313- 926-5594

Now to change to another topic. Our association with the Indiana Alliance has some info to share. The Democrats released a bill that will allow the government to negotiate lower drug prices. The bill is Lower Drug Price Negotiation Bill.

- H.R. 3 repeals the so-called "no interference clause which currently prohibits the government from negotiating lower drug prices and requires the Secretary of Health and Human Services to negotiate on up to 250 of the most expensive drugs, including insulin. It is a lengthy bill and the highlights are:
- Limiting prices to International Drug index. Prices would be limited to 120% of the average cost of the drug in six other countries (Canada, United Kingdom, France, Germany, Australia and Japan).
- Excise Tax on Drug Corporations profits. Drug companies that do not comply with the agreed above would be subject to a 65% to 95%.
- The bill would limit increases to Drug prices under Medicare Part B and D. Cap on out-of-pocket drug spending under Medicare. The cap would be at \$2000 a year. This is a plus when according to The Kaiser Family Foundation, the average out of pocket spending is over \$8000.

We will be decorating the Hall on December 2nd and would love to have all the help we can get. As I close out this chat, I speak for the Executive Board when I say we wish a Very Merry Holiday Season to all and we may face concerns in the New Year but I have faith that we will continue to stay strong. We will have a new set of by-laws to consider and a new calendar for the upcoming New Year...
