



COOKIE recipe

T'is the season to be baking!

...With Reese's Peanut Butter and Hershey's Bake Shoppe Pieces

HERSHEY'S MINI KISS[™] PEANUT BLOSSOMS 1/2 cup shortening 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Heat oven to 375°F. In large bow/

1/2 cup shortening 3/4 cup REESE'S Creamy Peanut Butter 1/3 cup granulated sugar 1/3 cup packed light brown sugar 1 egg 2 tablespoons milk

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon salt Additional granulated sugar 1 3/4 cups (10-oz. pkg.) HERSHEY'S MINI KISSES Semi-Sweet or Milk Chocolate Heat oven to 375°F. In large bowl, beat shortening and peanut butter until well blended. Add 1/3 cup granulated sugar and brown sugar, beat until light and fluffy. Add egg, milk and vanilia; beat well. Stir together flour, baking soda and sait; gradually add to peanut butter mixture, beating until well blended. Shape dough into 1-inch balls. Roll in granulated sugar, place on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Immediately place 3 MINI KISSES Chocolate on top of each cookie, pressing down sightly. Remove from cookie sheet to wire rack. Cool completely. About 4 dozen cookies.

"YOU DON'T NEED NO CREDIT CARD TO RIDE THIS TRAIN"

FIREHOUSE SALSA RECIPE Get a large pot to put in!!!

Ingredients:

10-15 large red tomatoes. Hothouse or beefsteak work best chopped or ground up in food processor

3-5 large bell peppers. Use whatever colors you like for taste— red yellow orange green etc. Chopped-seeds and tops removed

1-2 large onions peeled and chopped. Red or white is best


4-5 tablespoons table salt

2-4 tablespoons black pepper

1 can tomato paste——helps thicken it up so it's NOT so runny

1-2 bunches cilantro chopped-stems removed2 large limes

Use a food processor or utensil tools to cut and chop up tomatoes, peppers and onions together in pot. Add tomato paste to help thicken up. Add salt and pepper. Squeeze limes to get all juice out of them, Zest limes into pot to get some lime skin/zest in pot (adds flavor and acidity). Add chopped cilantro without stems. Stir



thoroughly and Low simmer on stove for 15 minutes to help reduce and do not let simmer for more than 15 minutes.

***Chill to thicken more at least 2 hours. Then serve with chips, food, etc.

Then there are those who are out to ruin a time of happiness and cheers. The "Scammers and Imposters" seeking to steal your "Joy" when our guards are down.

Here are just a few tips that might be helpful when making your purchases:

1. Watch your wallets and billfolds and shop wisely. When shopping, do your research and find out about the product, who is the seller and does a warranty come with the product. This can be helpful to you in making sure you are purchasing from a trustful source.

2. When shopping online be sure to shop on a secure website that has an "https" address.

3. When looking for the best deals online or in the local retail shops or stores compare prices against online and your local retail shops or stores.

4. Make sure your packages are delivered to a secure locator or pick them up at the retail store.
