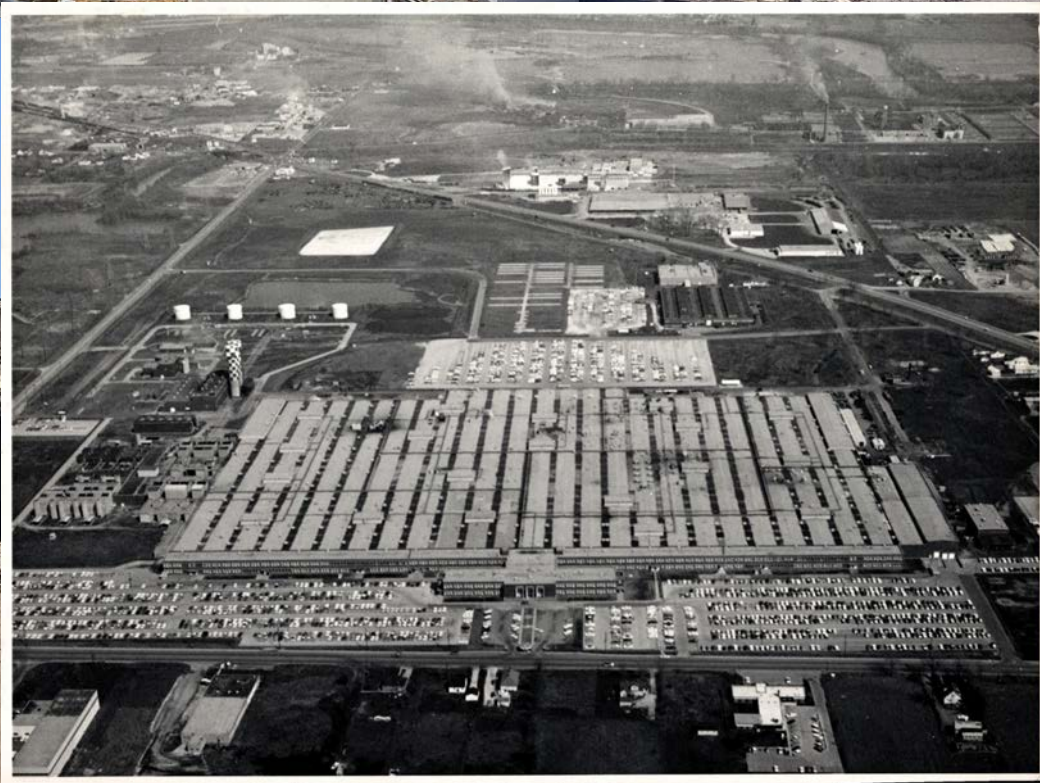

## Farewell Plant 5

They say all good things come to an end and for Plant 5 Rolls-Royce that is the case. Plant 5 was erected in 1942 as General Motors/Allison Engine and led a war time effort to manufacture thousands of V1710 aircraft engines. There was not much steel available at the time so prefabricated thunderbird pillars were installed to support the wooden roof framing. Two million square feet of building was put up in less than four months. At the time, machinists were in short supply, so processes had to be simplified to allow workers to deliver quality components quickly. Between the Speedway and Maywood Plants General Motors hired 20,000 workers. Of those 20,000 workers, 30% were women who contributed greatly to the war campaign.

I watched with sorrow as the excavators tore into the front lobby of Plant 5. If those walls could talk, they would unveil great stories of success. They would tell of generational efforts to support our military. The walls and floors that were saturated with the blood, sweat and tears of workers and in some cases families, who have shaped, built and created its legacy.

Today we usher out 79 years of history, as Plant 5 is demolished. We begin to write the next chapter with the \$400 million dollar renovation investment in two manufacturing areas and one assembly area. As Project Condor nears completion, we can now set our sights on future investment in our test facilities. There is a future Advance One Engine in development along with new technologies being developed in Liberty Works.

Our great Union had a big hand in all of this: Union workers together in solidarity since September 17, 1941. The UAW-CIO International representee John Bartee and 20 others became charter members of Local 933 at that time. On October 12, 1941, temporary officers were elected. By early 1943, the UAW had enough signatures for an NLRB election in April. This year, 2021, marks the 80th Anniversary of our UAW Local 933.

So, as we say goodbye to Plant 5, we look forward to new beginnings in refurbished facilities and a future legacy we can all be a part of building. Thank you UAW Local 933 for being here with us and supporting our workers through it all.

The National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) is a New Deal agency established by Congress to implement and enforce the National Labor Relations Act (NLRA). The NLRA is the law giving most private sector workers the right to join and take action—whether through forming

a formal union or not—to improve their pay, benefits, and working conditions. These rights are more relevant now than ever, as demonstrated by the recent wave of strikes and job actions by health care workers and workers at Amazon, Instacart, Whole Foods, Trader Joe’s, and other companies. {Lynn Rhinehart}

On January 20, 2021, the swearing-in of our 46th President, Joseph Biden, sent chills throughout the entire labor movement and hope that many valued initiatives lost under the previous administration would soon be restored. The NLRB has been turned upside down and has become more pro-employer than pro-labor over the last few years due to union-busting Council appointments that resided over the agency.

The NLRB endured a number of challenges throughout the previous administration and a Republican-majority that was not typically union-friendly.

- The Board ruled against a group of Walmart workers that took to the streets in a five-day strike, ruling that their action was not protected by labor law.
- The Board ruled that employers may discipline workers just for mentioning a union drive to a colleague during working hours.
- The Board challenged an Oregon law that prohibits an employer from discharging, disciplining, penalizing, or threatening actions for not attending meetings in which religion or political views will be communicated. The Board cited the employer’s First Amendment rights captive audience speech.
- In July, 2020, the Board ruled that union representatives could be properly discharged for making offensive comments while engaged in protective union activity such as grievance-handling. This action alone prompted UAW to issue guidance and awareness that the NLRB is no longer labor-friendly.
- August, 2020 guidance clearly states that an employer during the pandemic is not obligated to engage in mid-term bargaining regarding COVID leave, nor provide hazard pay. Expression of one’s COVID-19 safety does not rise to the level of protected concerted activity.

However, the union has an opportunity to shine and make headway for new gains; we are putting the employers on notice that we are sick and tired of being sick and tired.

The labor movement needs a permanent fix, not something that will come and go depending on who is in office. As Robert Verbruggen, writer for the National Law Review states, “Congress should not have turned this much discretion to an unelected board. And it is never too late for it to discuss how to handle these issues, reach a compromise, and write the rules into law!”

As such, I am an admirer of the Protecting the Rights to Organize (PRO) Act. The PRO Act will strengthen the 1935 National Labor Relations Act, which is long overdue. The PRO Act is designed to address various issues with the current law and give the worker a fighting chance, and aid in protecting the workers who wish to organize. Here are a few measures of the PRO Act:

- Ban Right-to-Work Laws
- Institute “stealth” card check
- Institute a monetary penalty for an employer’s unfair labor practices
- Ban employers from permanently replacing strikers
- Allow secondary boycotts

It is well-recognized that these are bold initiatives and the Act will likely not fix all of the labor issues. However, I would rather aim high and miss, versus aim low and hit.

The National Labor Relations Act was passed in 1935 and thereafter Union Membership grew. Also referred to as the “Wagner Act”, the NLRA is what gave Unions the right to organize and collectively bargain. The National Labor Relations Act seeks to correct the “inequality of bargaining power” between employers and the Trade Unions by promoting collective bargaining between employees and employers. Due to this vital legislation, Union participation increased from 10% in 1932 to 33.4% in 1945.

Once again, Union participation has fallen to 10.8% of America’s total workforce. It is absolutely the time to, again, change the trajectory of Labor in America. The education and engagement of our Membership and our communities is vital to the Labor movement and through education and activism we can accomplish what we have set out to obtain. Union participation determines Union democracy. Members can be active by attending meetings, joining committees and running for office. It is your right as a UAW Member to have your voice heard. Additionally, our Region 2B Online Academy is a way to build your knowledge at your fingertips. I encourage all of you to participate in this program and to share what you learn with your coworkers and in your communities.

# UAW Local 933

## IN HISTORY

The following is an excerpt from the currently unpublished book *"History of Local 933"*



During the fall of 1949, the Local Union membership decided that we should build a home of our own for our offices and a meeting place. We previously had our Local Offices in the K. of P. Building at the corner of Pennsylvania Street and Massachusetts Avenue, where we had been located since we organized.

In the early days we rented the UAW Local 226 Hall located on the southeast corner of Senate Avenue and Maryland Street for our meetings. The Robert

Hall Clothing Company took over this building, so we started renting the VFW Hall located on the northeast corner of Ohio Street and Delaware for the holding of our membership meetings. We used our two-room office building at 1010 Main Street, Speedway, Indiana for meeting of Committeemen and Alternates, or for meetings of small groups of our members. All this renting of office space and meeting hall did not seem practical to the membership so they voted to build our own hall.

Walter E. Newman was contacted to construct the Local 933 Hall, blueprints were drawn up and a bid of \$14,750.00 was presented to the membership as the building cost. The membership then authorized the building of the Union Hall. At that time our treasury was very low (\$5,631.40), so the membership voted to assess each member the sum of Three Dollars (\$3.00) to help pay for the building. The building was started in November, 1949, and was finished in March, 1950, after some changes had been made. When the building was finished, it had cost us \$16,617.40. This new building was an addition to the small building that we owned at 1010 Main St., Speedway,

and became our present home. The painting of this building was performed by a group of volunteer members who donated their time. By March 31, 1950, we had a new home for the Local Union and a total of \$5,503.58 in the treasury. This building was constructed with concrete footings the roof was made of concrete with precast concrete beams, capable of passing building codes for the support of a second story.
