"Let us have, a festive day during which a parade through the streets of the city would permit public tribute to American

Industry" (Peter McGuire, Irish-American Unionist, May 18, 1882). Between 10,000 to 20,000 people joined a parade through Lower Manhattan, organized by New York City's Central Labor Union on September 5, 1882. "The windows and roofs and even the lamp posts and awning frames were occupied by persons anxious to get a good view of the first parade in New York of workingmen of all trades united in one organization," reported the New York Tribune of that first Labor Day Celebration, according to history. com. Labor Day has been a Nationally Celebrated Holiday in the U.S. since

1894 when President Grover Cleveland signed into law legislation to set aside the first Monday in September to Celebrate Labor Day – A day to recognize and honor the hard-working citizens of the United States.

### FUTURE VERTICAL LIFT


The United States Army has decided to modernize its long-

range assault aircraft. Through this effort the competition has narrowed to two supply teams. Bell/Textron Helicopter who specializes in vertical lift airframes with Rolls-Royce selected as their engine provider (AE1107 made in Indianapolis). The Bell/ Rolls version, the V-280 Valor, has a leading edge with range

and power. The competition has Lockheed Martin (Air Frame) pairing with Sikorsky (engine provider). The Lockheed/Sikorsky version is the Defiant X. The United States Military will decide this fall which team will take home the prize. The Army plans to acquire as many as 4,000 aircraft for the Future Vertical Lift Program. This contract, if won, will support UAW workers in both facilities for years to come. With a \$400 million facelift of our facilities here in Indy and another \$390 million investment in four new test cells, UAW/Rolls-Royce Local 933 is ready for the challenge.

The UAW has stepped up efforts to support Rolls-Royce and Bell Helicopter with lobbying efforts since both employ UAW workers. This is another example of your union dues at work.

With Labor Day quickly approaching (September 5, 2022), I would like to personally thank all of our current work force and families for all of your efforts this year. We celebrate Labor Day to honor the American worker. I would also like to thank our one thousand plus retirees for all you have done to ensure we have good Union jobs long after you left. ### STANDING IN SOLIDARITY

The 38th UAW Constitutional Convention took place July 25 - 28th

in the Automotive Capital of the world, Detroit, MI. As a Distinguished Guest, I watched in amazement as 836 elected delegates hashed out resolutions to issues brought forward by locals throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and Canada. In a remarkable display of solidarity, the 836 delegates actively engaged in the democratic process as they voted, debated, challenged, and resolved a number of issues according to what they believed would be most helpful for the workers they were sent to

represent and for the United Auto Workers as a whole.

The same spirit of solidarity that permeated the 38th Constitutional Convention has found its way back to Allison Transmission. On August 5, 2022, more than 1000 members in good standing made their way to various polling sites throughout the ATI campus and Union Hall to cast their vote for a mid-contract wage proposal submitted by ATI.

When the votes were tallied, the membership had spoken loudly and clearly as they rejected the company's wage proposal with a stunning 92.3% NO vote. The membership is undoubtedly angry that enough was not offered to get our lower-seniority members out of the paycheck poverty cycle created by the tier system, but there is so much more.

In solidarity, the membership stands. The membership has spoken, and they are saying,

"It's our time!" We are our brother's keeper, and we believe in fairness for every member. It is time to end the tier system; it's time to bring back the 3-year contract; it's time to bring back our COLA; it's time to do away with the HSA insurance; it's time to give all off-shift workers an honest shift premium; it's time to bring back a guaranteed "defined benefit" pension plan. Allison Transmission jobs used to be coveted, but today they have become a bad joke. We build a premium product, and the company wants to continue to do that on the backs of an underpaid and underappreciated workforce. We say NO! It's time to get back on the right track. A top-shelf employer would never have to hang banners over the fence to advertise for prospective employees.

The bankruptcy of 2007 cost Autoworkers much of their past gains, benefits, and money fought for by our brothers and sisters over the many years of their working lives. That period in history has passed. Our employers are making record profits, and we are still fighting to get back what our brothers and sisters earned in the 50s, '60s and '70s, and what we conceded in 2007 to stay afloat. Workers were promised those concessions back when the Auto Industry turned the economic conditions around and became profitable again. But, like many other managerial comments, that promise seemed to magically disappear.

When I presented management with the results of Friday's ratification vote, our managers asked me, "What happened?" I should have stated that 2007 happened, but I soft-shoed it instead. I explained that our members, your workers, are MAD. This company, a TOP shelf employer from its beginning until 2007, has treated its employees like they are working in some 3rd world plant. We were never recognized for our efforts during the covid crisis, and we haven't been recognized for our concessions that turned the industry around in 2007. The vote says "it's our turn!" It is time to get back to the philosophy of "Treat and compensate the workers as the business goes." In other words, "IT'S OUR TIME."

### 2023 PROGRAM

The Richard T. Gosser Scholarship Program accepts applications from the daughters and sons of UAW Region 2B members. The ACT test is required. If the student has not previously taken the ACT, they should sign up to take the ACT test in the coming months and have your test scores sent to our office by listing our code number #9894.

Finalists are based on ACT scores and will be notified in writing. As a finalist, applications are assessed by a team of prominent community leaders and educators, who then select the winners based on ACT scores, class rank, extra-curricular activities, letters of recommendation, personality traits and leadership abilities. Documentation regarding class rank, extra-curricular activities, letters of recommendation, personality traits and leadership abilities are required from all finalist, but not required with the initial application.

with a pandemic of several strains of Covid. As Seniors we have paid a steep price financially as well as physically.

I want to explore what is referred to as the **Safety Net.** The definition is **something that provides security against misfortune or difficulty.** Other words that fit are safeguards, preventive measures, insurance, and several others. This pandemic has pointed out the value of a safety net and how important it is to Seniors; interest rates, gas

prices and shortage of items at the supermarket. It seems we must depend on the government to deal with these events. Now when we say government it is pretty much a two-sided issue. Let's narrow this article to programs of top interest to Seniors; Medicare and Social Security. **Day one:** Almost 1,000 delegates from the U.S., Puerto Rico and Canada gathered in Detroit and were addressed by speakers Detroit Mayor Mike Duggan, Michigan Senator Gary Peters, March of Dimes President Stacey Stewart, James Brudney a member of the UAW Public Review Board and NAACP President and CEO Derrick Johnson. The delegates debated resolutions and amendments to align the Constitution language with the recent referendum on direct

elections of international officers and regional directors. A resolution for ranked choice voting was defeated and instead the delegates adopted runoff elections in the event there was no clear winner in elections for UAW international officers or regional directors.





**Day two:** The delegates heard speeches from Congresswoman Debbie Dingle Michigan's 12th Congressional District and AFL-CIO President Liz Schuler. For most of the day delegates focused on resolutions to the Union's constitution such as creating Region 6 which is made up of Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, Hawaii and Alaska. During more debate the delegates voted against a proposal to make retirees eligible

for International office. Stronger language was approved to include higher education in the Union's constitution regarding areas of jurisdiction. Salaries for international staff and officers were approved along with new

language that specifies base salaries of staff and officers instead of using a formula. Also, a resolution was approved for no cap on maximum contributions to candidates during any election cycle international or local.

**Day three:** The delegates heard from Michigan Governor Gretchen Whitmer and U.S. Secretary of Labor Marty Walsh. Delegates unanimously approved language committing to advocating for women's equity, gender justice, combating gender-based harassment and violence in the workplace. Another resolution was passed by delegates for strike pay to begin on Day 1 rather than Day 8. Nominations for international president, secretary-treasurer and vicepresidents took place. The voting for these positions will take place by mail-in ballot. One of the two open trustee positions was voted on by the delegates and Emilio Ramirez was elected out of a field of four candidates.



Day four: Nomination / election for the second open trustee position took place and Dana Davidson was elected. Wilma Liebman UAW Ethics Officer gave her report and delegates approved a recommendation to extend the ethics committee until 2026 as well as strengthening the UAW Ethical Practices Codes. The convention was concluded with the delegates approving the use of gender neutral language, strengthening the language on local union members, adding an organizing committee to its standing committees, authorizing the International Executive Board to use legal resources to

recoup the costs related to the court-appointed monitor and raise strike pay to \$400.00 weekly.


